

Robert M. (Bob) Sterling

Robert M. (Bob) Sterling was born on Oliver Street in Newark's Ironbound section. He graduated from West Side High School in 1936. He

played first base on the varsity baseball team for two years.

In January 1938, Sterling enrolled at Panzer College in East Orange. In the course of the next four years, he became one of the school's most celebrated athletes, earning four varsity letters each in baseball, basketball and soccer.

Bob was a member of the renowned Panzer basketball team that won 44 consecutive games (60 of 61), a record at the time. As a baseball pitcher, he once won four games in a single week (five games in 10 days), a feat that was noted by Jim Ogle in a Star-Ledger article.

Longtime Panzer athletic director and coach Al Gorton named Sterling

to both his all-time Panzer baseball and basketball teams.

Between 1946 and 1957, Sterling served as the only assistant coach for baseball, basketball and soccer at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, winning more than 60 percent of his games coaching the school's freshmen and junior varsity teams. He earned a master's degree in administration and supervision at the school in 1947.

In 1957, Bob became Piscataway Township High School's first athletic

director, a position he held until his retirement in December, 1986.

Sterling also gained notoriety as a basketball referee for more than 30 years at the high school, college and international levels. He officiated basketball at the Pan-American Games in 1955 (Mexico City), 1959 (Chicago) and 1967 (Winni-peg). In addition to the Central American championships in Guatemala (1966) and the South American championships in Cali, Colombia (1955).

Sterling also refereed numerous county and state basketball championships in New Jersey in his officiating career. In 1963-64, he was elected president of the North Jersey Board #33 of IAABO, one of the largest and

most prestigious groups of its kind in the country.

During his tenure as a high school administrator, Sterling served as president of the National Council of State High School Coaches Association (1969-70), president of the New Jersey Interscholastic Coaches Association (1964-65), as a member of the executive committee of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association (1968-74) and president of the Middlesex County Athletic Directors Association (1966-67).

In 1964, Sterling founded the Mid-State Conference, a group of eight Central Jersey Group III and Group IV high schools (including Piscataway) that competed athletically. He served as president of the conference for two terms and had a conference coaching award named in his honor.

For more than 35 years, Sterling was known to New Jersey high school track and field athletes, coaches and fans as the "voice" of the state's outdoor track and field championships, serving as the meet's chief announcer.

Bob is married to the former Florence O'Mara of Millburn, an outstanding high school and college athlete in her own right. The couple have three grown children.
